#### **COMMUNITY SUPPORT - FOOD COOP**

Dear Supporters,

This week 67 families/couples and 46 single people have accessed the Food Co-op (179 adults and 113 children). Donations were received from several local churches, individual supporters, a primary school, and other small food providers with a surplus of specific items. All donations were most welcome especially as the numbers remain high. Over the first 8 weeks of 2024, 836 food parcels have been collected by 491 families and 345 single people (1277 adults and 856 children).

For Easter, we aim to provide all members with a bottle of cooking oil, soap powder, fresh eggs and modest chocolate eggs for the children. Donations of oil and chocolate treats would be appreciated.

We welcomed the newly appointed Migrant Health Nurse at the QE Hospital who stayed and chatted to the volunteers and members. Her role is community based and she anticipates attending when she is free on a Tuesday.

It was a very busy session, with people keen to come in due to the cold wind. We were able to distribute several pairs of gloves and hats, fleece blankets and hot water bottles to those who needed them. Many people stayed and enjoyed the warm space, drinking tea, coffee and making the most of the delicious soup.

# Why is there a difference?

One the day of my ordination I was given a gift from a friend. It was a notebook and on the front it says, 'Be careful what you say, I may use it in a homily'. There have been quite a few things written in it over the time since I was given it.

At the weekend I was noting something down and this little section came into my head.

On Sunday evening, a parishioner said that they had missed singing the Holy Holy during the Sunday morning Mass; this got me thinking about when was the last time that the Mass parts were said rather than sung; not specifically here, but in all the parishes across the country.

In our secular world we mark different times of the year with different symbols, colours, and events; the Trooping of the Colour for the King's birthday for example. In the Church, we mark the different liturgical seasons in very similar ways; using the colours green, red, purple, and white. But there are other changes that we make that are equally as significant. We don't sing or say the Gloria during Lent or Advent, we do not have flowers in the Church during Lent, we cover or remove statues and crucifixes from the Church on the 5th Sunday of Lent and we have a wreath lit each week during Advent. These are to name but a few of the things we do.

However, we are also asked to mark the different seasons throughout the year by choosing to include or omit certain music or to reduce what music is used. During Lent, for example, the church is told not to have instrumental music (it may be used in some circumstances, though it must be limited), as Lent is a time of reflection, fasting and penance, music during the liturgies of the season is meant to be less celebrative. Whilst I would not want us to have hymns that are 'dirge' throughout Lent, it is an opportunity to say the Mass parts rather than sing them or to sing them with plain chant music. Keeping things much simpler during such times as Lent, means that when we get to Easter, our celebrations will be even more beautiful as we hear and sing those things that we may have missed during the season that has passed.

# **Exposition**

Exposition before each Mass continues as we progress through Lent. It is good to see so many taking up the opportunity to spend time with the Lord in this way. It is also moving to see how prayerful the Church is before Mass. This is something that quite a few people have commented on and I feel it is important to pass that on.

It is so good to see so many people coming into the Church as quietly as possible. I encourage us all to be ever mindful, whilst Exposition continues before Mass, to keep this in mind.

Lent is only 6 weeks long, and we are already half way through. It is good to do things differently.

# **Combined Liturgy Group**

For quite a long time now I have been thinking of establishing a Liturgy Group for three parishes. I would like this to be a group of people who are enthusiastic about Liturgy or perhaps would like to know more about what liturgy is and be open to learn and contribute as a member of a group. I would like us to look at the liturgical year in advance, examining what needs to be planned and organised for each liturgical season, as well as looking at other opportunities to worship and praise God outside of the traditional Mass setting.
